

WHEN DID THE FIRST ROTARY MEETING TAKE PLACE?

On February 23, 1905, Paul Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary Club meeting. They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Harris's desire for camaraderie among business associates brought together these four men and eventually led to an international organization of service and fellowship.

Read about each of the first four Rotarians below, and about Harry L. Ruggles, who is often called the "fifth Rotarian."

Rotary's founder, Harris, was born in Wisconsin, USA, on 19 April 1868. He was raised by his paternal grandparents in Vermont and attended the University of Vermont, Princeton, and the University of Iowa. He was Rotary president from 1910 to 1912 and a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago until his death on 27 January 1947.

Loehr, a mining engineer, was born on 18 October 1864 in Carlinville, Illinois. He was a Rotarian for only a few years, never holding office at the club or international level. But that first Rotary meeting was held in his office, Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. He died in Chicago on 23 May 1918.

A Rotarian for only a few years, Shorey served as recording secretary during the club's first year. He was born in Maine in August 1862 and died in March 1944.

Schiele, a coal dealer, served as the Chicago club's first president in 1905 and Rotary International's third treasurer in 1945. Born in Terre Haute, Indiana, in June 1870, Schiele attended Terre Haute Business College and served in the U.S. Army during the Spanish-American War. He was president of the Schiele Coal Company from 1902 until his retirement in 1939. He and Harris became lifelong friends and lived near each other on the South Side of Chicago. Schiele died on 17 December 1945 and is buried near Harris at Mount Hope Cemetery.

Originally from Michigan, Ruggles was a graduate of Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, and joined Rotary at its second meeting. He was treasurer of the Chicago club during its first year, president from 1908 to 1910, and a Rotary director from 1912 to 1913. He is known for having introduced singing to Rotary club meetings. His printing company, H.L. Ruggles & Co., printed the first issue of The National Rotarian and the first Rotary songbook. He died on 23 October 1959, an honorary member of seven clubs in addition to his home club, the Rotary Club of Chicago.

WHY DID THE ROTARY FOUNDATION COME INTO EXISTENCE?

The Rotary Foundation was born as an endowment fund in 1917, the brainchild of RI President Arch C. Klumph. It was reborn 12 years later in the form we know today, The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. However, it wouldn't be until after the passing of Paul P. Harris in 1947 that TRF would reach the financial health and world importance that it enjoys today.

Technically speaking, it is a not-for-profit corporation that supports the efforts of Rotary International to achieve world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational, and cultural exchange programs. It is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.

Its expenses are borne solely by the interest earned on its contributions over a three year period. As an endowment fund for Rotary "to do good in the world". It has grown from an initial contribution of US\$26.50 to more than US\$1billion. It has one of the largest and most prestigious international fellowship programs in the world

Its event-filled 100 years has been a story of Rotarians learning the value of service to humanity, and the citizens of the earth benefiting from that service. Rotary has received \$355 million in challenge grants from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Rotary committed to raising \$200 million by June 30, 2012 and met that goal by January 2012. This represents another \$555 million toward polio eradication.

The Humanitarian Programs of the foundation help fuel international Rotary projects to improve the quality of life, providing health care, clean water, food, education, and other essential needs primarily in the developing world.

A major Humanitarian Program is PolioPlus, which seeks to eradicate the polio virus worldwide. Through its Educational Programs, the Foundation provides funding for some 1,200 students to study abroad each year. Grants are also awarded to university teachers to teach in developing countries and for exchanges of business and professional people. Even its former participants in the Foundation's programs can continue their affiliation with Rotary as Foundation Alumni.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

WHO IS THE SECRETARY GENERAL OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL?

The executive staff manages operations at RI World Headquarters, including member services and programs, finances, technology, development, strategy, legal services, and our international offices in Buenos Aires, São Paulo, Zurich, New Delhi, Seoul, Tokyo, and Parramatta (Sydney).

John Hewko is the general secretary of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.

From 2004 to 2009, Hewko was vice president for operations and compact development for the Millennium Challenge Corporation

(MCC), a U.S. government agency established in 2004 to deliver foreign assistance to the world's poorest countries.

At MCC, he was the principal United States negotiator for foreign assistance agreements to 26 countries in Africa, Asia, South America, the Middle East, and the former Soviet Union. During his tenure, he completed the negotiation of

assistance agreements

totaling \$6.3 billion to 18 countries for infrastructure, agriculture, water and sanitation, health, and education projects. Prior to joining MCC, Hewko was an international partner with the law firm Baker & McKenzie, specializing in international corporate transactions in emerging markets. He helped establish the firm's Moscow office and was the managing partner of its offices in Kyiv and Prague.

While working in Ukraine in the early 1990s, Hewko assisted the working group that prepared the initial draft of the new Ukrainian post-Soviet constitution and was a charter member of the first Rotary club in Kyiv. Hewko has been a public policy scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, an adjunct professor of law at Georgetown University, and a visiting scholar at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He has published papers and articles in leading U.S. and international publications, and he has spoken extensively on political and business issues dealing with the former Soviet Union, Central Europe, Africa, and Latin America. He is also a member of the Council of Foreign Relations.

Hewko holds a law degree from Harvard University, a master's in modern history from Oxford University (where he studied as a Marshall Scholar), and a bachelor's in government and Soviet studies from Hamilton College in New York. As general secretary, Hewko leads a diverse staff of 800 at Rotary International's World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA, and seven international offices. Hewko is a Paul Harris Fellow. He and his wife, Margarita, live in Evanston.

WHAT IS ROTARY'S MOTTO?

Rotary's official mottoes, Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, trace back to the early days of the organization. In 1911, He Profits Most Who Serves Best was approved as the Rotary motto. It was adapted from a speech made by Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland convention also inspired the motto Service Above Self. During a convention outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Paul P. Harris, who also was on the boat trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mot-toes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was modified by the 2004 Council to They Profit Most Who Serve Best and by the 2010 Council to its current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best.

WHERE WILL THE NEXT R.I. CONVENTION BE HELD?

The Rotary International Convention, organized by the Rotary International will take place from 24th June to the 27th June 2018 at the Toronto Hilton Hotel in Toronto, Canada. The conference will cover areas like Rotary International Convention and local Rotary members are already hard at work making sure your stay is as enjoyable as possible. This bustling metropolis is the perfect venue for our biggest event of the year because like the city itself, the convention brings together people from around the world who are eager to celebrate and share their diverse backgrounds.



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Rotary Youth Exchange is one of the most rewarding programs of Rotary International. Every year 9000 students crisscross the globe to spend one academic year in a foreign country, hosted by multiple Rotarian families. They are thus global ambassadors while learning a new culture and making friends from across the world. It is an exchange the makes an indelible mark not only in the life of the students but also their parents and hosts. Travelling to a new destination is intriguing, but to get the opportunity to live there, to learn the lifestyle and maybe even be one among them, the feeling is ineffable.

After grade 10, I applied for the Rotary Youth Exchange program and a few months later, after sending out the application and an interview, I got to know that I was going to Germany. The Rotary Youth Exchange officers were very organized and arranged for orientations in safety, public speaking, etiquette. Their guidance and support made a wonderful variance.

The first half of my exchange was a constant game of charades, trying to decipher the language and communicate with the locals. Over time, with constant encouragement and trying at every chance, I became fluent in the German language. As a chance to study abroad, I went to school there, commuting by local and public transportation. Learning in a language one is just beginning to learn is an interesting puzzle itself. Tours across country (and for some, the continent of Europe) are also part of the game.

I had two host families who, went out of their way to make my exchange marvelous, treated me and took care of me just as one of their own. I bonded with them so well that I now have two homes with them and they are just as close as my real family. I encountered other exchange students from various parts of the world and the more time we spent together and shared our stories, it turned into a potpourri of multi- cultural, multi-racial relationships, creating friendships for life. Change. It's a herculean part of going on exchange other than being a cultural ambassador, representing a country. I once came across a quote by Oliver Holmes "A mind that is stretched by a new experience can never go back to its old dimensions."

My experience may be different than the others but now that I have returned, I find myself being able to talk to anyone, more outspoken, confident, mentally stronger, lot more organized, and independent. I've learnt more in this seemingly long time than I would ever have in the next five years of my life. While I spent my time learning the ways of Germans, I spent a lot of my time portraying my culture – food, art, dance, language, stories and folklore I grew up with. Hence, fulfilling the goals of Rotary –Fellowship, Integrity, Diversity, and Service.

My exchange year did have a few valleys but the peaks touched the sky. I may have been away from my family a while and I may have missed a year of schooling. But this once in a lifetime experience was definitely worth it and if ever possible, I would do it again. I would encourage every 15-18 year old to take part in this safe, exciting and life changing event. This, without doubt, has made me a better person and has given me a greater cognizance of the world, widening my perspective. And as it is rightly believed by every exchange student, "It's not a year in a life, but a life in a year."
